Thirteen Culvers Congregate at Blakesburg



To celebrate the Fiftieth Anniversary of the Culver Cadet, Culver owners and enthusiasts from all across the United States met in Blakesburg, Iowa on Saturday, September 2, 1990 as part of the AAA's 1990 National Reunion. The 13 Culvers in attendance represented the largest known gathering of the Mooney-designed Cadets at any fly-in to date.

Saturday afternoon at Antique Field, Anniversary Chairperson Burke Bell (Boulder CO) greeted more than 45 people to an informal group meeting. Some of the people in attendance bragged about the Culvers they'd flown to the Reunion, while others bragged about Cadets that are promised to be ready for tentative future get-togethers. Burke and Judy, along with Dan Nicholson and Pat Botts, supplied snacks.

The Culver Fiftieth Anniversary reunion was a tremendous success thanks to the hard work and warm hospitality of lots of people. Thanks should go out to the staff and crew at Blakesburg, and a special note of thanks to the entire Taylor Clan at Antique Field in Blakesburg.

Award Winners

The Culver Fiftieth Anniversary Reunion was capped by the awards ceremony. Steve Givins (Anderson IN) swept most of the awards, but nobody seemed to complain. Steve's Culver LCA #133 (NC 29264) gets attention and awards wherever she goes, including a beautiful cover shot on the January 1990 edition of Vintage Airplane.

Steve and #133 collected both the "Best in Class" award from the AAA, as well as the "Culver Owners Award" from the other Cadet owners present at the Fiftieth Anniversary celebration. Burke Bell and his blue and white Culver LFA #452 (NC 41730) was selected "Chapter Choice of the Potomac Antique Aero Squadron."

highest combined ages. George Cottrill (St. Louis MO) and his 1941 Culver LFA #334 (NC 37829) took the award. With #334 nearing her fiftieth birthday, and George past his seventy-fifth, neither are planning on slowing down anytime soon.

The original owner of #334, George got the plane in an interesting deal with Al Mooney back in 1941. Culver Aircraft had moved to Wichita, Kansas and was experiencing financial difficulties. The owner of Airpath Instruments, George was offered a new Culver Cadet from Al Mooney in exchange for an extension of credit and more instruments.

George took delivery of #334 from the factory and spent the next 25 years using the little wooden flyer to make sales calls for Airpath. One of those many calls was to Piper Aircraft in Lock Haven, Pennsylvania, where the Bill Piper, Jr. became interested in the purchasing one of the plywood planes.

On returning to Lock Haven, the new Culver was rolled and damaged on landing. George remembers that the splintered little Cadet was stored in a shed at Piper for years.

George says that his #334 is now "sitting in my hangar down in St. Louis, just growling at me 'cause it's out of license."



The Culver Anniversary gathering featured a number of interesting people with stories to tell about the Cadet. BOB SHORT (St. Louis MO) stopped by over the Labor Day weekend and shared his Culver knowledge with the other attendees. From 1941 to 1945 Bob worked for Al Mooney in the development of the PQ-8 and the PQ-14 target drones, so he was able to talk about many Culver features that other owners had not heard of. Al Mooney's company worked closely with the Air Corps during World War II. In fact, Bob's work on the Cleveland

brakes for retractable landing gear of the military drones led to the development of the "clips" used on all modern Cleveland brakes.

AL OWENS (St. Louis MO) also has some interesting tales about the Culver PQ-14 drones. Al worked as a ferry pilot in the southern U.S., delivering the target drones to Air Corps bases throughout the South.

NEAL LAFRANCE (Wichita KS) is another Cul-

ver fanatic. He is currently building a steel-tube fuselage Culver at his home. Neal can offer any Cadet owner some interesting ideas about rebuilding the little plane. He is available at (316) 722-2494.


